It is fitting in this year, the 150th anniversary of Gustav Holst's birth, we at Morley celebrate his musical and educational legacy here at our Waterloo Centre for Adult Education. Music at Morley has an enviable reputation, not only for the breath and depth of musical education and training available for the thousands of students who study with us each year, but also for the artistry, skill and experience of the staff team, many members of which enjoy notable profiles as performers, arrangers and composers in London and well bevond.

Building on Holst's legacy from his time as Director of Music (1907-24) - sustained by Michael Tippet (1940-51), and then by esteemed colleagues that followed the opportunities in Music at Morley continue to be both accessible and ambitious, encouraging all to learn lifelong.

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Courses in instrumental and vocal training, ensemble performance and composition combine with more recent additions, including the Opera School, Jazz Ensembles and Engine Room Sound Art, to create one of the most exciting and engaging musical destinations for adult education in the UK.

The College's commitment to live performance stems directly + from our former Director of Music. Morley maintains an extensive programme of public concerts and performances, given by a rich array of choirs and ensembles. I am delighted that to mark this 150th anniversary the College will stage a special sequence of concerts to celebrate the remarkable music of Gustav Holst. I do hope you will join us.

Gustav Holst at Morley

Classical music is an integral part of Morley's DNA and it was at Waterloo where the Morley College Choir was founded by Gustav Holst, an English composer and teacher where he was Director of Music at Morley (1907-1924).

Best known for his orchestral suite, *The Planets*, he composed many other works across a range of genres. His distinctive compositional style was the product of many influences with Richard Wagner and Richard Strauss being most crucial early in his development. Holst's collection of work holds significant historical value which inspires our music department and its current students at Morley today.

In 1893, Holst left Cheltenham for London to study composition at the Royal College of Music. After + finishing at the college, Holst discovered that 'man could not live by composition alone' and took various organist posts at London churches and became a professional musician, playing the trombone in theatre orchestras. It was in 1903 when Holst decided to abandon orchestral playing to concentrate on composition, however his earnings as a composer were too little to live off and in 1905 he accepted the offer of a teaching post at James Allen's Girls' School, Dulwich which he held until 1921. This was followed by his teaching posts as Director of Music as St Paul's Girls' School, Hammersmith, from 1905 until his death.

At the end, there will be an informal sing-through of both pieces. There is also the opportunity after this session to join one of the participating choirs in their following rehearsals, leading to a concert of Holst's music on 14 March called 'Harmony of the Heavens'. This will be accompanied by the Morley Chamber Orchestra.




Penny Lecture - Holst at 150: Re-assessing his achievement
